

9:00am After break fast you will have an **Orientation meeting** by your Altruvistas facilitator, Malia Everette, the local guide and program coordinators on general Rwanda travel information and logistics, as well as an overview of the program.

10:30 am Enjoy guided **historical tour of Kigali**. Our highlights of precolonial, colonial, independence, genocide and post-genocide times.

1:00pm Lunch at the **Hotel des Mille Collines**, the famous "Hotel Rwanda"

The Hôtel des Mille Collines has managed to endure the traumatic events of 1994, depicted so forcefully in the movie "Hotel Rwanda," but much like Rwanda as a whole, it cannot shake the memory of the killing frenzy that took place just outside its leafy grounds and that left 800,000 or more ethnic Tutsis and moderate Hutus dead. Most of us will remember the gripping Hotel Rwanda with Don Cheadle. Jan.25 Kigali (B, L)

9:30am Panel Briefs to introduce the policies, strategies, structures and achievements by the Ministry of Gender and Family Promotion, the National Women's Council and the Gender Monitoring Office (http://www.gmo.gov.rw/). We will earn about their important work since 2008 to: Putting in place basic indicators in respect of gender and submitting them to various institutions; Provide advice on gender related issues through research and disseminate findings to relevant institutions for gender responsive policy formulation; Provide Gender status reports for the implementation of national gender related laws and policies; Develop and provide guidelines on domestication of international gender related commitments/treaties ratified by Rwanda and prepare and monitor its implementation; and Receiving and examining complaints relating to injustice and gender based violence andforwarding them to relevant institutions for further actions and monitor the quality of services provided to GBV victims.

12:30am Next we are off for a site visit to the **Akilah Institute for Women** and will have lunch with the students there. The Akilah Institute for Women opened its first campus in January 2010. Akilah offers a 3-year Business Diploma with majors in Entrepreneurship; Hospitality Management; and Information Systems. Jan. 26th Butare (B,L)

8:00am Leave for our day excursion to Butare

10:30am We start our day with a visit to the Visit to the **National Musuem.** Butare is said to be the centre of intellectualism in Rwanda. The Museum is located on over 50 acres rather 20 hectares of land. The buildings themselves take up 9,000 square metres. The land has been turned into gardens having indigenous vegetation and a traditional craft training centre, turning the whole place into an educational experience and a pleasure to tour. We will have time to enjoy the artifact collection is essentially historical, ethnographic, artistic and archaeological. The public collection is displayed in seven rooms with the remaining artifacts in storage.

In addition, RWANDA ART supports its members through the provision of technical and entrepreneurial trainings as well as through micro-credits for small business ventures. 11:30am We leave for an excursion to **Gashora** to learn about rural development programs. Exchange with the community to learn about their challenges and hopes and interventions in a Vision 2020 community that has been modeled on the UN Millenium Villages Project.

This afternoon we will engage with **the Rwanda Girls Initiative** (www.rwandagirlsinitiative.org/ggast/) and engage with the **Gashora Girls Academy**, a school dedicated to the education of girls, particularly in the fields of science and technology an upper-secondary boarding school for 270 girls. We will learn about educational services.

Our full day also concludes with a visit to **COVAGA** – **The Cooperative of Weavers of Gashora**, which was founding in 2004 to fight poverty http://rwanda.ecuad.ca/about.html.

8:30 am Check out of and transfer to Gisenyi. We will travel 60 miles to **Gisneyi on Lake Kivu**. We will check in to the Lake Kivu Serena Hotel and

have time to relax on the beautiful beach there. Lunch is at the hotel. 3:00pm Visit to the **Kanembwe community** where over 600 families have been relocated from landslide and flood areas and have found a new home to celebrate their cultural heritage – many of the inhabitants are of the Batwa ethnic group, a historically marginalized people and an ethnic minority in the country who are now integrated more formally into society

Dinner On our own at one of the 3 hotel restaurants. We can make a group reservation at the **Ziwani Café**, which is located below the pool overlooking the white sandy beach of the lake. Ziwani is also the venue for our beach BBQs, poolside BBQs and evening sundowners, all of which feature live local music and traditional Intore dancers.

January 31st Gisneyi (B,L)

9:00am Introduction to the coffee production process 'from crop to cup' he shores of the beautiful Lake Kivu. After we will visit to a coffee plantation, a washing station and a factory.

Christine has worked for TransFair USA in Rwanda for nearly 3 years as TransFair's Rwanda Project Consultant. We will spend today with her to visit with farmers in their fields and visit with the coffee washing station to learn about their work, coffee produciton and the socioeconimic difficulties they face.

February 1 National Heroes Day (B,L)

9:30am Today we will keep open for Reception with his Excellency and National ceremonies in Kigali. We will confirm activities as details are presenting.

Tis possible that the group leaving on the 2nd will check out of the hotel and check back in to the hotel in Kigali. The others will stay in Gisneyi.

Previous plans were to learn about the gender story of coffee and meeting with

the women of **Kotwi bakabo**, Some estimates over 70 percent of fieldwork and coffee harvesting is done by women. But when it comes to ownership of land or the harvested, marketable coffee, those numbers drop to below 20 percent. Looking at these numbers it would not be an exaggeration to say that women make the coffee trade possible, and it would also be hard not to conclude that deep rooted structures of patriarchy and male-dominance are essentially stealing from women. Those numbers may be a bit different in Rwanda, where many women were widowed by the genocide. Because of that experience, and in part due to the impressive egalitarian nature of Paul Kagame's national government (highest percentage of women elected officials in the world at nearly 50 percent), women play a relatively more prominent role in Rwanda's coffee cooperatives and farming communities. http://www.fairtradeusa.org/get-involved/blog/empowering-women-rwanda

Seeing mountain gorillas usually involves a 2-4 hours of hiking to find them. Thus this might be a long day and the hikes can vary quite a bit depending on where the animals spent the night and which troop you are seeing. Don't

underestimate the tiring effects of being at moderate high altitude, about 5000 feet. Those wanting to engage in the hike should bring: Gardening gloves, regular weight/not-super light khakis and hiking shoes/low boots. The guides will provide the rest.
